NOISE CONTROL OFFICER

The Corporation of the City of North Vancouver requires a Noise Control Officer to co-ordinate and act as the focal point in enforcing a recently enacted Noise Control By-law. Other agencies involved are R.C.M.P. and By-law Enforcement Officers. Reporting to the Chief Public Health Inspector, investigation and measurement of noise complaints and surveys; and reporting to the Council of the City of North Vancouver on enforcement of the By-law. This is inspectional and regulatory work in promoting and maintaining an established standard of environmental health in the City in the enforcement of the Noise Control By-law.

The successful candidate must possess a C.P.H.I.(C.) and preferably membership in good standing with the Canadian Institute of Public Health Inspectors. Preference will be given to those possessing a Certificate in Noise Measurement. Candidates must be willing to drive their own personal car, for which they will be reimbursed according to the North Shore Union Board of Health's policy.

Assignment: The placement commencing April 1, 1979 is temporary for 1979 with possibilities for continuation on a permanent basis should the results achieved in 1979 warrant extension.

**Ken Martin**, a former Public Health Inspector at Boundary Health Unit, is to be congratulated on his recent promotion to the Director of Occupational Environment Branch. He indicated that there are 27 Inspectors in his department with their head office at 4211 Kingsway in Burnaby. They also have regional offices in Victoria, Nanaimo, Prince George, Kamloops, Kelowna, Nelson and Chilliwack.

His department administers and enforces the Factories Act and Occupational Environment Regulations which refer to occupational health and environment issues plus working conditions in the work place. Their objectives are accomplished by inspection, enforcement, plan approval of work premises and educational programs. Their activities involve both technical and labour-management relations.

Mr. Martin stated that the services of the PHI's are invaluable in solving problems related to staff facilities plus where water supplies, waste disposal or communicable diseases are involved.
