We currently have two vacancies on the Board of Registration. If anyone among our membership is interested in volunteering, please contact Steve Chong for further information.



Greg has recently completed an Environmental Science degree from Trent University in Ontario.



Greg worked for several weeks providing assistance with Victim Identification, Body Search & Recovery, Debris Clean-up, and assisting the locals in putting their lives back together.

BOC Corresponding Member's Report

A discussion paper was presented to the BOC on November 07, 2003, recommending that the BOC alter the administrative policy and/or requirements for certification to reflect a mandate for continuance of certification based on the maintenance of continuing education credits.

Since that submission the NEC has partnered with Health Canada's Public Health Agency to form a Core Competency Steering Committee and a Core Competency Working Group. The NEC/BOC has representatives on these committees with our goals being providing educational opportunities for members and the enhancement of the profession.

Corresponding members report to date:

I regret I will be unable to report to the membership in person and I send my best wishes to all Public Health professionals and members attending the educational conference and the AGM.

A lot of things are happening since the conference in Charlottetown and we are very fortunate to have Anne Thomas leading us as the new chair of the BOC. Anne's forward leadership, goal oriented approach and, passion for our profession will benefit all practicing Public Health Professionals. I know you share with me our best wishes and our sincere appreciation to Bernie Chrisp for all the years he has volunteered in the position of Chair of the BOC.

Change in the form of integration or segmentation is one of the consistent forces facing us in public health. We are up to the challenge and are supported in our partnership with Health Canada and the Public Health Agency. The NEC, through the strong leadership of our National Executive, and the BOC are involved in the Core Competency Project with our vision being enhanced education. You will hear or have heard our National President's presentation on Core Competency and you will undoubtedly have some questions or possibly concerns. This is the time we need you to become involved and ask those questions and voice those concerns. It is the voice of this membership that will help your National Executive and the Board of Certification develop a profession that meets the core functions of Public Health in Canada and exceeds the professional competency expected by the public.

Regulatory Negligence, Due Diligence and Professional Competency are the new measure of a professional in this field of Health and both the NEC and the BOC are working to ensure as a professional "WE" and "YOU" measure up. So what we need of you is to consider all the points our National President has expressed during the presentation and visit the webpage, submit comments to the committee and help shape your future.

On the business side of the BOC we had a significant number of appeals in the last set of exams and these appeals were reviewed by the appeal panel. All appeals were rejected except one that was reviewed with the examiner and sufficient grounds were found to accept the appeal. The BOC continues to consider PHI Technicians issues, the need for examiners workshop training, and reviewing schools offering Public Health Inspection training. At the BOC we are continually reviewing our policy and procedures to ensure they meet the present and future needs of practicing PHI's, and students.

Recently, the Core Competency facilitator Robert Bradbury brought together the educational institutions in Toronto. The various educational institutions represented at the meeting support the efforts of the Core Competency committee and are excited to work with the NEC on this project. The Working Group continues to develop a plan, model and terms of reference.

Congratulation to Alison and Art on their wonderful new family.



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

Canadian Institute of Public Health Inspectors, BC Branch Annual General Meeting March 15, 2005

My first term as BC Branch President has been hectic to say the least. It has been a challenging year, but has had many rewards from opportunities in meeting with the membership to liaising with the National Executive Committee, which has given me a more national perspective on issues across Canada. This opportunity would not have been possible without the support of my employer at Vancouver Coastal Health, and manager, Kelvin Higo, who continues to be an ardent supporter of the Branch and its activities to further the profession.

I am disappointed to report that there has been no progression in our attempts to have Environmental Public Health Officers designated as professionals. We were recently set back with the appointment of a new Minister of Health Services, the Honourable Shirley Bond, on December 15, 2004. Correspondence has been sent requesting a meeting to discuss the status of our application, but there has been no response and I am of the feeling that there will be no consideration until after the Provincial Elections in May 2005. The Branch will renew its efforts when the political environment stabilizes.

The 2004 BC Branch Education Conference was another huge success. The 2-day format has been well received by membership and the feedback is encouraging. The Education Committee of Roopy Khatkar, Jasmina Egeler, Joanne Lum, Patricia Tymiak, Salima Kassam, Nigel Headley, and Jennifer Montgomery, continues to improve the quality and format, and will take this expertise into the joint 2010 IFEH World Congress and CIPHI Annual Education Conference. Support from the Regional Directors has validated our efforts in providing these educational opportunities to assist with the professional maintenance of their staff. Interest has been expressed from other regions to host the conference, and the Branch is looking at the possibility – this is a definite first for the Branch!

The electronic distribution of the BC Branch newsletter, the BC Page, continues to be well received via email. Roger Parsonage is to be commended for his tireless efforts in putting the publication together. I am sorry to report that Roger will be stepping down as Editor at the end of 2005. On that note, we will be looking for another volunteer(s) to take on this important role of keeping the membership informed on current events.

The Branch website is currently in the process of undergoing a major facelift. We are reviewing several proposals from contractors to redesign our site to improve the look and layout – the primary goal will be to make it into a "must" resource for membership, where they will be able to find all the information related to the Branch and educational resources. Furthermore, I am happy to report that our webmaster, David Butt, has been able to secure the new domain name of www.ciphi.bc.ca, which is consistent now with other Branches across Canada – something that we've tried to do for the past several years.

Advocacy on behalf of membership is a large part of the daily activities conducted by the BC Branch. An example of this was the position statement (Attachment 1. Sewerage Regulation Position Statement) issued by the Branch supporting the inclusion of Environmental Public Health Professionals as "authorized persons" under the new BC Sewerage System Regulation, which comes into force May 31, 2005. The Branch has received correspondence from Sewerage System Regulation Steering Committee that a formal response will be forthcoming addressing the Branch's statement.



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
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
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
