

FOOD SAFETY IN SRI LANKA

John Gibb has just returned from Sri Lanka (the former Ceylon, located just off the south eastern coast of India) after having completed his first CESO assignment there. John was asked to go over and assist a hotel which had been damaged by the 2004 tsunami get back on its feet in order to become more attractive to package tour operators.

The project involved setting up a basic food safety training program for hotel staff, some of whom had only a "few" years of schooling a most spoke only Singhalese. John put this training together and with the help of the hotel owner translating, walked the staff, sometimes one by one, through the basic principles. "it was great fun working with staff in a foreign language, around their various shift schedules, days off, local holidays, cycles of the moon and my twelve and a half hour jet lag!" said John.

<u>NEW AWARD FOR</u> ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH <u>PROGRAM</u>

The Bill Leith Endowment was established at BCIT by William D. Leith in December 2006. The annual interest provides an award to recognize the academic and allround achievements of a graduate from the Environmental Health - Public Health Inspection, fulltime Bachelor of Technology program, who is deemed by faculty to be the **"most promising public health inspector."** The first award will be presented at the BCIT award ceremony in June 2008.

Bill has supported BCIT's Environmental Health -Public Health Inspection program for over ten years, which has resulted in many students receiving recognition and funding for their achievements within the program.

The Environmental Health - Public Health Inspection program at BCIT prepares graduates with the expanded knowledge, skills and attitudes necessary to meet the current and evolving needs of employers, the profession, and the community; fosters in graduates a commitment to life-long learning and professional growth; and provides an appropriate combination of specialty, research and multi-disciplinary courses that will promote the development of critical thinking, problem solving, decision making and communication skills.

Bill Leith commenced his career as a Public Health Inspector with the City of Vancouver Health Department in1950 and retired after 35 years service from the Position of Deputy Chief Inspector. He has been a long time and active member of the BC Branch, CIPHI and a strong supporter of the Environmental Health - Public Health Inspection program since its inception at BCIT back in the mid 60s. Bill has held numerous offices on the BC Branch executive for nearly two decades and currently continues his participation in Institute affairs as an Auditor for the Environmental Health Foundation of Canada. In 2000 Bill was awarded **Honorary Membership** in the BC Branch for his significant contribution to the Institute and his support for students and graduates of this program.

Our heartiest thanks to Bill for the new endowment he has established at BCIT and his significant contribution to the profession.

Dear Dr. Emerson,

Please accept this letter as the British Columbia Branch of the Canadian Institute of Public Health Inspectors' response to the "Conversation on Health" with respect to the Consultation Public Health Act – Version 2. We wish to express our gratitude for your recognition of our association as a stakeholder in this process, as we believe our members contribute significantly to the health and well being of all British Columbians. Through the Public Health Act our members have been able to provide key preventative health intervention services and taken measures that have resulted in substantial positive impacts in British Columbian communities and, at times, reached significance at national and international levels.

The new Public Health Act has recognized several key provisions contained in the former PHA regarding matters of relevance to our members such as: powers and duties; health hazard inspection and abatement; regulation of activities which may cause health hazards; and communicable disease control. We concur with the importance of acknowledging and retaining these significant provisions, and enthusiastically welcome new provisions concerning: mandated public health promotion planning; broadening of health assessment and surveillance; and clarification of public health emergency provisions. The new initiatives recognize the fluidity and pace of socio-cultural, ecological and epidemiological change, and are well served to lead future public health initiatives. In addressing evolving public health issues, ensuring consistency between the MHO's and the PHO is desirable in ensuring a consistently effective response.

With respect to improving aboriginal health our organization welcomes challenges that may present themselves in achieving this goal. We believe that all persons in British Columbia should be able to have good health and good quality of life. Our organization has professional recognition both nationally and internationally, and we have members that have historically, and presently provide effective public health services within aboriginal communities.

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Since our national organization has embarked upon and is committed to professional accreditation, we will be in a position to ensure continued provision of qualified professionals through our certified members. We consider education and advocacy as key principles and so welcome the opportunity to provide further information on our professional accreditation initiative, with respect to the proposed mechanism in the PHA for the Minister to regulate our profession. We believe that our national level professional accreditation will meet or exceed the Minister's expectations and thereby allow our organization to be self governing, as is with other professional bodies operating within British Columbia.

We greatly appreciate the opportunity to be involved in the review of the BC Public Health Act Renewal. It is comforting to see that the proposed Act maintains the roles for Environmental Health Officers and expands the scope to be dynamic with the changing health challenges that lie ahead, including the important role we can play in health promotion activities. We look forward to continued involvement in this process of Renewal.

certification, John developed his soon to be famous HACCP 101 course for senior and middle management. This training received rave reviews from management who will spend the next several months implementing the agreed to work plan by training their staff on the standard operating procedures and having these materials translated into Singhalese.

The tea industry, for which Sri Lanka is a leader, is moving towards requiring manufactures to meet HACCP standards. John had the opportunity to stay on a tea plantation and to tour a tea processing plant where his "thoughts" were requested. "After working with a hotel's food services and all of it's "menu items" (there must be at least a million recipes for curry), setting up a HACCP system for a tea factory would be a cup of tea, no pun intended, once you figure out a way to keep the birds out and to get everyone to remove their shoes" John opined.

CESO stands for the Canadian Executive Service Organization, which is made up of over three thousand Canadian volunteers from every imaginable background, and now even includes an Environmental Health Officer.

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IN MEMORIAM

Robin Gear

Robin Gear passed away peacefully with her husband by her side at the Nanaimo Regional General Hospital on November 24, 2007 at the age of 49 years. Robin is survived by her loving husband Wayne; daughter Elizabeth and son Michael (Amber): parents Ralph and Margaret Annis: brother Stuart: sisters: Gayle and Diane: and five nieces. Robin was predeceased by her twin brother Robert in 1958.

Robin started her career in Environmental Health in Saskatchewan in 1983 upon graduating from BCIT. After several years in Saskatoon an opportunity arose in the Upper Fraser Valley Health Unit and she moved back to BC. She soon became the Deputy Chief Public Health Inspector in the Central Fraser Valley Health Unit (CFVHU) located in Langley. During her time in the Fraser Valley she became involved and very interested in drinking water quality issues. It was also during this period of time that she met Wayne Gear and they were subsequently happily married.

With the breakup of the CFVHU, due to the regionalization of health care in BC, her position was transferred to the South Fraser Health Region. Later when the Fraser Health Authority was formed, Robin became the Manager of Environmental Health Protection in the Newport office serving the Tri-Cities area. Although she excelled in her position and was well liked by her staff and colleagues, Robin continued her acute interest in drinking water quality issues. When the position of Drinking Water Coordinator for the Vancouver Island Health Authority was created she saw this as her long-awaited opportunity to really make a significant contribution to protecting the health of the public. Robin applied for the position in Nanaimo and was quickly accepted. During her three year period as Drinking Water Coordinator she accomplished a great deal and built bridges with many individuals and agencies involved with providing, consuming or regulating the drinking water industry.

Recently Dean Scovill wrote, "Robin was a well respected colleague who supported, encouraged and showed compassion for her staff. There were many kudos for her style of leadership. Robin also showed compassion for those in need. For years, Robin networked with various government agencies. She was involved with groundwater studies in the Fraser Valley. Robin's name is seen in several reports which are still widely used today. I have always said Robin was ahead of her time in public health. She contributed immensely to our profession. We have lost a great individual."

A Memorial Service was held on Wednesday November 28th 2007 in the Chapel of First Memorial Funeral Services of Nanaimo. Reverend Fred Massey presented a wonderful story of her life. Her many accomplishments were attested to by her friends and colleagues. Her father indicated he was so pleased with the wonderful attendance, the very kind words about Robin and her successful career.
