#### 2018 CIPHI Ontario Awards Recipients

Congratulations to the following members who were awarded for their achievements and dedication to public health.

#### **AWARD OF EXCELLENCE**

Shain Mergulhao was the recipient of the Award of Excellence, which is awarded to a CIPHI Ontario member for his or her outstanding work in dissemination of public health information within the province and abroad. Through her Master's degree, Shain researched key barriers to public health inspectors from achieving enhanced compliance in restaurant inspections, where she found fear or lack of understanding of enforcement and legal processes, fear of conflict, and inability to effectively communicate to be the primary barriers. Based on these findings, Shain organized an enforcement workshop at the 2017 CIPHI Ontario Annual Educational Conference, and an impactful communication training in June 2018.

#### DAVE PATTERSON MEMORIAL BURSARY

David Han was the recipient of the Dave
Patterson Memorial Bursary Award, which is
given to a deserving student who has applied
to the Board of Certification to sit their
certification exam. David completed his
Board of Certification practicum with Durham
Region Health Department in 2017. One
bursary is provided annually to cover the
cost of the certification examination.

#### **CELEBRATING 50 YEARS OF MEMBERSHIP**

Each year, members are recognized at the President's Gala for their dedication to their profession. A sincere congratulations to both Mr. Gravel and Mr. O'Donnell.

#### Michael J. Gravel



Michael J. Gravel graduated from Ryerson in 1969 as a member the first two-year program, which was affectionately known as the "guinea pig" class. His association with CIPHI Ontario began that same year.

Michael began his career with the Sudbury & District Health Unit, and later moved to Peterborough, where he was appointed Director of Public Health Inspection in 1987.

His passion for the field of public health and his desire for more led to a keen interest in the affairs of the profession. Michael sat as a Board of Certification examiner, and he served as Ontario Branch Councillor (1976), Secretary-Treasurer (1978), and President (1981). Following his tenure on the Ontario Branch Executive, he held a two-year term as a National Executive Councillor (1984-1888).

He was often heard saying, "Don't ask what the Institute is doing for you, get involved and find out what you can do for the betterment of the Institute."

Michael was an esteemed and respected public health professional, whose persistence and ability to compromise for all earned him tremendous respect among provincial and federal partners.

According to Mr. Gravel, following his volunteer efforts with the institute (along with his "big mouth"), he was granted a Lifetime Membership with CIPHI in 1989.

#### William O'Donnell

William O'Donnell graduated from Ryerson and began working as an inspector for the Sault Ste. Marie Board of Health in 1968. He worked as a public health inspector between 1968 and 1982, when he was promoted to a management position as Deputy Officer. He served 37 years with the health unit, retiring as the Administrator of Environmental Health and Control of Infectious Diseases in 2005.



In 1973, William was part of the Ontario Branch Conference Committee when Alogma hosted the annual conference, and he received his 25-year member pin in September 1996.

He served as the Ontario Branch Historian between 1985 and 1998. The Canadian Institute of Public Health Inspectors honoured him with lifetime membership in 1998 for his twenty years of service as Ontario Branch Historian and volunteer work; he was nominated by Jim Reffle who was serving as the Ontario Branch President.

William has written several papers relating to the history of public health in Algoma. Algoma Public Health created an education grant supporiting local students interested in pursuing a career as a public health inspector, in recognition of the four O'Donnells who served in public health agencies: William O'Donnell Sr., William O'Donnell Jr., Bud, and Terry.


"I continue to research and write local public health history as a way to acknowledge the work of public health professionals over the years. We sometimes wonder whether what we do makes a difference in the life of our community but the objective reflection on our history shows that we do...When I was at the Ryerson homecoming this year they presented 50 year pins to the class of 1968. When I received my pin I thanked the President for the training I was given. That training and the certification by the Canadian Institute of Public Health Inspectors has led to a rewarding career. Thank you for the 50 year pin. I will wear it with pride."

#### SUMMARY OF 2018 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The recent CIPHI Ontario Branch annual general meeting was an opportunity to connect with colleagues and have a say in the direction of the profession.

The Branch Executives and working group members provided a summary for the past year, and highlights are provided.



#### PRESIDENT SUMMARIES

Outgoing President Raymond Ramdayal spoke of amendments to Regulation 566 and the previous threat to remove the PHI credential. He remarked admiration and pride as PHIs came together in their loud and collective response to the MOHLTC. The PHI credential came out the other side stronger than before the amendment changes. This speaks to the sense of duty inspectors take to ensure continued security for the health of Canadians. Moreover, our response to the attack on our profession paid respect to sanitarians and inspectors that came before.

Next, a Code of Conduct for OBEC was presented by Raymond Ramdayal. Its intent was directed to not only Ontario, but as a National initiative that looks inward at the conduct of the Executive and its volunteers. There is an inherent responsibility that CIPHI has to establish expectations on the conduct of those who lead our organization, which should not differ from what our employers require.

Incoming President John Cannan highlighted the importance of connecting with students as the future of our profession. He remarked the transition to the president's role would be smooth and thanked Raymond for his guidance over the past year and into the future.

#### FINANCIAL REPORT

Kate Beath provided a financial update for 2017 and expressed thanks to the Finance Committee. Membership revenue was on par with previous years, net assets were discussed, and the financial statement was accepted by membership.

#### **COUNCILLOR REPORTS**


Tamika Latibeaudiere-Palmer projected a membership engagement campaign, acknowledging barriers to membership exist and encouraged continued membership. She mentioned Environmental Public Health Week preceded the conference and AGM and was supported by a thoughtful and comprehensive social media campaign.

Rachael McArthur spoke of recent and well-received workshops and a commitment to continued educational opportunities. The Impactful Communication workshop was well attended with about 40 participants and thanks was expressed to Public Health Ontario as a partner to the CIPHI Ontario Seminar Series for continuing to provide PHI-specific content.

Kwesi Douglas declared his goal was to increase social media presence and discussed the website being outdated. Plans to create a LinkedIn account and build external partnerships were proposed, and he wants to conduct a survey to identify PHI occupational health and safety issues in the field. In addition, a communications calendar and promoting PHU awareness was outlined.

Lori Holmes proposed a membership drive to increase numbers and investigate why regular memberships are trending down. Taking into account recently certified members, the attrition of regular memberships is unknown. Once again, awards and bursaries were not capitalized and funds remain unclaimed. She encouraged students and members to review funding opportunities.

#### WORKING GROUP SUMMARIES

Membership Group Chair Lawrencia Ntiri recalled the importance of the membership survey in 2017 which lead to swag and perks with external partners.

Communications Working Group cochair Emily Morrison announced the group has new student members and is developing a communications plan, providing opportunities to improve web content, and is building a social media presence.

Professional Development Working Group member Marina Lee identified the goal for 2019 is to maintain the seminar series and develop the professional develop section of the website.



# BOARD OF CERTIFICATION BRANCH REPRESENTATIVE SUMMARY

BOC Branch Representative Fatih Sekercioglu mentioned accreditation for Conestoga College is due for renewal, and advised of discussions about curriculum development and training opportunities for students. Nationally, the accredited schools agreed new instructional objectives will be released at the October 2020 certification exam and consideration of a competency exam for international candidates is being developed.

#### COPE REPRESENTATIVE SUMMARY

CoPE representative Michelle Marcus spoke about the Professional Development worksheet, mandatory membership, and developing a framework of the Professional Development process.

#### **BRANCH HISTORIAN SUMMARY**

Branch Historian Grant Lafontaine eloquently closed the session by remarking our field is subject to political and technological change and our pride in where we have come from makes us better to meet challenges as a unified front. Our artifact collection continues to grow from retiring members and from PHUs.

He encouraged colleagues to explore the collection and shared some gems including, the USSR delegation from the 1980s conference and 1950s articles posted from the Ottawa Conference for restaurants to prevent live chickens running from the kitchen and weekly fumigation to control cockroaches. He mentioned the sacrifices from those who came before us and that we should look to the past to learn from our mistakes and prevent recurrences.

# BARB MARSHALL RETIRES AFTER 39 YEARS IN PUBLIC HEALTH

Barbara (Barb) Marshall retired in the summer of 2018 after a fulfilling 39 year career.

An encounter in 1977 while living in Sooke, British Columbia influenced her career path. Looking out of her window, she noticed someone with a clipboard holding a small plastic bottle. Her interest was piqued when she learnt environmental health officers (EHO) conduct well water surveys. With a Bachelors of Science from the University of Guelph, she entered the fast track program at Ryerson Polytechnic Institute and became a certified PHI in 1979 - one of the few female Public Health Inspectors at the time. She completed her field training at Wellington Dufferin Guelph Public Health (WDGPH) and valued the morning coffee and information exchange with her colleagues.

Her first job was with Algoma Health in Elliot Lake and her 'bush pilot' Director, Art Ruggles, would fly her to remote inspections. She later joined the City of Scarborough Public Health, where she experienced cockroach eradication and more importantly, softball and curling, as was mentored by a fun group there. Around 1985, and again in the early 2000's, she was fortunate to return to WDGPH, where she became a manager under Director Rob Thompson during a grassroots time in public health. Managing a multi-agency Trichinosis outbreak from a smoked wild boar was a highlight.

As an exemplar of getting involved in the profession, she represented

CIPHI on the Ontario Public Health
Association Board and started the
Environmental Health Work Group,
and she was on the Board of Directors
of the Ontario Food Protection
Association. Barb also taught at
Ryerson University when Professor
Marilyn Lee was on sabbatical, was
adjunct professor in the Population
Medicine Department at the University
of Guelph, and was a member of the
editorial board of the Environmental
Health Review.

In 2003, Barb was invited to work nationally with enteric diseases and never looked back. She was honoured to end her career with the Public Health Agency of Canada and helped create an innovative enteric disease surveillance program, FoodNet Canada. Today, FoodNet Canada flourishes and has expanded with sites in 4 provinces.

While at PHAC she completed a
Master's Degree of Environmental
Studies from York University,
presented at CIPHI Annual
Educational Conferences, and taught
food safety to Central American EHOs
in Barbados in addition to the WHO
Intercountry Workshop on Foodborne
Illness Surveillance. Barb was
committed to research supporting
evidence and informed policy for
public health in Canada.

Barb was proud and grateful to have worked as a Public Health Inspector for nearly 39 years, and to have worked with inspiring colleagues who became her friends. She always kept the CIPHI Code of Ethics tacked up beside her desk, and in 2018 renewed her CIPHI membership as a retiree.





# MARCO VITTIGLIO RETIRES AFTER 40-YEAR CAREER

In 1978, Marco Vittiglio graduated from Ryerson with a Certificate in Public Health and has an impressive 30 years in Toronto Public Health Management. He was engaged in strategic, program and operational planning, developing benchmarks, leading change, managing programs and projects, and supervising groups of focused and multi-disciplinary staff delivering programs and services under varied organizational structures.

For the last 6 years, Marco was Associate Director, Healthy Environments responsible for the difficult task of balancing the division's budget during uncertain times and led the Environmental Health Management Team otherwise known as – "Everything else but Food Safety".

Marco's delivery of numerous public health programs exemplifies extensive experience in health hazard investigation and risk management with specialties in business processes and systems. Over the years Marco managed numerous programs such as Food Safety, Tobacco Control and Enforcement, Safe Water, Rabies Prevention and Control, Injury Prevention, and Infection control.


