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Closure of an illegal Meat Processing Plant and Uninspected **Meat Investigation in Toronto**

Background

On December 20, 2004 Toronto Public Health Inspector (PHI) received a notification from a Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) Officer that there was evidence of illegal meat processing inside a vacant building: Investigation began in the evening of December 20, 2004 and on December 22, 2004 evening, PHIs observed 4 men delivering a large number of boxes to a vacant warehouse. The inspectors suspected that this was a delivery of uninspected meat. The men completed the delivery and left the establishment, and further observations indicated that no processing was being undertaken at the time.

On December 23, 2004 morning, PHIs returned to the location and observed workers processing poultry inside this establishment. The poultry product consisting of raw chicken, pigeon, ducks and a few turkeys. The condi-



tion of the poultry was poor and the meats were contaminated with dirt, feathers, fecal matters and debris. Other products found inside the establishment included duck tongue, poultry testicles duck fat, chicken feet, chicken livers etc. The poultry was not properly packaged or tagged as required by the Ontario Food Premises Regulation and the Ontario Meat Act. The poultry and poultry parts found in this establishment were considered to be potential health hazard and were seized and held on site by the inspectors. Inspectors also found a large number of "Breast & Wing Tags" from two licensed processing plants in Ontario being used inside this operation.

On behalf of the Ontario Branch Executive Council we extend our warmest regards to the CIPHI Ontario Branch membership and wish your families health and happiness in the New Year.

In response to the recent tsunami tragedy in South East Asia the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care: Emergency Management Unit through letter correspondence (January 5, 2005) requested that Ontarians wishing to volunteer their specialized technical and/or professional skills contact the Ministry. The CIPHI (Ontario Branch) Inc Executive committee in recognizing the environmental public health expertise which exists within certified public health inspectors in Ontario and Canada encouraged (CIPHI (ON BR) January 7, 2005 letter correspondence) interested Ontario Branch members to volunteer and offer their names to the Ministry.

In my recent reports to the membership I have suggested an era of public health reform currently exists in Ontario. Precipating factors to public health reform in Ontario include such events as the Walkerton Outbreak, SARS Emergency, BSE Crisis, Aylmer Meats Investigation, election of a new provincial government and their subsequent appointment of a new chief medical officer of health (Ontario). These events (above) have resulted in a myriad of inquiries/reviews and reports with recommendations to improve the governance and structure of public health in the province. Reports include:

- Report of the Walkerton Commission of Inquiry (Mr. Justice Dennis O'Connor)
- Report of the Meat Regulatory and Inspection Review (The Honourable Roland J. Haines)
- Justice Campbell's SARS Report (The Honourable Mr. Justice Archie Campbell)
- Walker Report(The Expert Panel on SARS and Infectious Disease Control)
- Operation Health Protection (Government of Ontario)

The reports can be accessed through the respective ministry links on the government of Ontario website at www.gov.on.ca As these reports may serve the basis for public health reform in Ontario we encourage Branch members to be familiar with their content.

- Amend HPPA and Food Premises Regulation to capture food businesses attached to private residences (Haines)
- Implement fee based registration system for food premises within health Unit jurisdiction (Haines)
- Creation of Health Protection and Promotion Agency (Operation Health Protection)
- Health Emergency Management (Operation Health Protection)
- Public Health Division organizational review, Mandatory Program Review

I was unable to attend the last ICFS meeting on Dec. 8, 2005. The minutes of this meeting are available via email for those interested.

The only other activity to report upon in the interim was a conference call I became aware of but was not invited to participate in on the ongoing issue of establishing mandatory food safety training throughout the province. The MOHLTC arranged this with most Health Units, but excluded the stakeholder group members that had been participating prior to this event in early January/05. The essence of the discussion was:

Industry does not want HU's / PHI's proctoring the exams given for the courses they deliver-this requirement was CIPHI's and ASPHEO's position. Mr. Ruff is to propose a compromise to them which would keep the provision for HU proctoring for the first two years of the implementation of the regulation, but commit to working with them over that time to come up with a satisfactory alternative monitoring method that would eliminate the proctoring by the end of the two years. He hopes that this will gain their support so that developing the regulatory instrument can proceed. I emailed MOHLTC stating that while this may or may not work strategically to move the issue forward given the industry intransigence on regulatory over sight, we would continue to insist that an effective regulatory mechanism be in place that assures that our collective fiduciary responsibility remain for the food service industry.

Water Issues

The Drinking Water Systems Regulation (O. Reg. 170/03)

The Drinking Water Systems Regulation (O. Reg. 170/03) was implemented June 2003 to address recommendations of the O'Connor Commission. The Ministry of the Environment Advisory Council on Drinking Water Quality and Testing Standards collected comments and provided feedback on O.Reg.170/03. Following the final public meeting on December 13, 2004, amendments to the regulation were passed into law on December 16, 2004, which extends the treatment deadlines for small private drinking water systems and some rural municipal systems by 6-18 months. The extension will allow for additional changes to the regulation based on the recommendations made by the Advisory Council on Drinking Water Quality and Testing Standards. CIPHI (Ontario Branch) representatives via teleconference attended the O.Reg. 170/03 consultation meeting, held on December 13, 2004, where discussions surrounding potential roles for Health Units and Public Health Inspectors in implementation were held. Some ideas have been shared on the potential of an enhanced role for Public Health Inspectors in the assessment, compliance, monitoring and enforcement of small drinking water systems.

Regulation 903 (Water Well Regulation)

Regulation 903 governs the construction, maintenance and abandonment of water wells and the licensing of water well contractors and technicians. A letter (dated January 14, 2005) was sent to the Minster of the Environment with concerns regarding the lack of regulatory oversight of Well Drillers and Contractors in Ontario (enclosed).

Tobacco Control

In 2003, an announcement was made by the Ontario government regarding a 100% smoking ban in public places and workplaces. Correspondence (May 17, 2004) was sent which applauded the Ontario Government on its announcement, efforts and leadership. In December 2004, Bill 164 – The Smoke-Free Ontario Act, was introduced in the house; it will ban smoking in all workplaces and enclosed public spaces in Ontario by World No Tobacco Day - 2006.

RE: Ontario Regulation 903 (Wells)

It is a pleasure to be corresponding with you on a matter vital to the health and well being for the people of Ontario.

On behalf of the Canadian Institute of Public Health Inspectors (CIPHI), Ontario Branch Inc., I am writing to you with concerns regarding Ontario Regulation 903 (Wells), specifically the lack of regulatory oversight of Well Contractors/Drillers in Ontario. Ontario Regulation 903(O. Reg. 903) exists under the Ontario Water Resources Act; and it sets out provincial regulatory standards for the construction, maintenance, decommissioning of water wells, and licensing/training of contractors/drillers and technicians. There appears currently insufficient capacity within the MOE to provide for regulatory oversight of O. Reg. 903. The result is that new water wells in Ontario are constructed and other wells are abandoned without meaningful regulatory oversight by your agency.

The public health community appreciates the importance of well construction and source protection in ensuring safe water. Recent events in Ontario have emphasized the importance of this issue. The Part Two Report of the Walkerton Commission recommended (#75) "The Ministry of the Environment should increase its commitment to strict enforcement of all regulations and provisions related to the safety of drinking water".

The CIPHI (Ontario Branch) Inc. believes the Government of Ontario must ensure that the Province's drinking water supply remains among the safest in the world. An essential requirement for a safe drinking water supply in Ontario is a strong and effective water inspection system. I look forward to an opportunity to discuss this issue with you (or designate) at your earliest convenience.

Health Unit Working Group meetings related to amendments to Ontario Regulation 170 pertaining to small drinking water systems have concluded. OPHA Board

A meeting of the OPHA board was attended, as a constituent society representative, on January 20 and 21, 2005. An orientation manual was received which included information pertaining to directors' roles and responsibilities, Board/Executive Director relations, and a financial policy memo.

OPHA financial reports were presented by the OPHA auditor Steve Schwets, a presentation was received from Owen Williams of Barber, Steward, McVittie and Wallace Insurance Brokers around the need for Directors and Officers liability Insurance for OPHA Board members.

Some discussion took place around the need for a governance and By-law review. There was agreement that a facilitated retreat may be helpful to move forward with the review.

The Executive Director presented information regarding a proposed upgrade to office infrastructure, such server and computer upgrades.

There were also two in-camera sessions.

OPHA Competencies Group

OMHLTC is are now interested in supporting the competencies project as it fits with the public health capacity and human resource development initiatives being undertaken by the Ministry for Operation Health Protection. A core group from the OPHA competencies group is drafting a proposal to the Ministry. There will be continued support from the Public Health Agency of Canada for this initiative.

The Ministry has also asked that we undertake a public health professional capacity mapping initiative to be completed by the end of March. OPHA hopes this initiative will be supported by the constituent societies. The Ministry would like to determine the number and qualifications of the professions working in public health at the health unit level if possible. They are gathering this information through various means, e.g. through mandatory program budget submissions. Another means would be through the professional associations to which public health professions belong. OPHA has been asked to lead this activity. More details will follow once the initiative is funded.

A retreat will be scheduled for a few people to review the core competency draft document and prepare for consultation.

Another deliverable that we are seeking funding for is enhanced communications about core competencies through the OPHA website.

A teleconference will be scheduled when funding approval for the proposal has been received.



PHI issued a Health Protection and Promotion Act, Section 13 closure order to the operator and a Closure Sign was posted at the door of the establishment. On December 24, 2004, PHIs conducted a joint inspection with OMAF & MNR Officers, OMAF inspected the

poultry and confirmed that these were uninspected meats.

PHIs condemned all the poultry products and a disposal company removed a total of 31,000 lbs.of uninspected meats from this establishment. The operator was charged for processing of uninspected meats and other health violations under the Food Premises Regulation.

Summary:

This is one of the biggest illegal meat processing operation found in Toronto and evidence indicated that large amount of poultry can be processed in this location every week. The distribution of the

uninspected meat is in the downtown area but we have reason to believe that the uninspected meats have been distributed throughout GTA to restaurants and store. We suspected that the operator was mixing inspected & uninspected meats, reusing of boxes from legal processing plants, reusing breast tags on uninspected poultry. The customers are usually small to medium size food premises (restaurants, food takeout and BBQ shops) which can sell a large number of chicken, duck and pigeon daily. The information of the operator was provided to the GTA Health Units in case PHIs also found meats supplied by this operator in their health unit.


It is getting harder to identify what is legal or not out there. However, as long as PHIs continue to take proactive action during routine inspection of food premises, we can control the source of uninspected meat at retail level and stop the distribution of unapproved food to the public.



Uninspected Meat 3 Duck




32 Uninspected Meat 6 Disposal of Meat


