

Ralph Stanley retires after 38 years with Peel Region Health Department

Ralph Stanley's retirement is the culmination of an incredible career and the beginning of another chapter in life. His retirement sparked mixed emotions as many were excited but sad and just a bit melancholy at the prospect of losing him from the workforce.

Ralph was a certified PHI and Supervisor with the Region of Peel for 38 years. He is an expert in myriad public health areas and was the lead for Peel's Safe Water Program for many years. Paul Callanan, his Director said, "It's been great working with Ralph all these years. He is very reliable and his passion for the Safe Water Program has served both Peel residents and our profession well".

Ralph was involved in water policy for the Ontario Public Health Association (OPHA) Environmental Health work group, and led the Association of Supervisors of Public Health of Ontario (ASPHIO) Safe Water subcommittee. He was appointed by the then Minister of the Environment to serve as a public health representative on the expert Advisory Committee on Environmental Standards (ACES).

Ralph assisted an expert public health witness during testimony at the Walkerton Inquiry, and was appointed to the Walkerton Clean Water Centre (WCWC) Research Advisory Committee (RAC). He is a certified instructor for WCWC, specializing in small drinking water systems and was appointed to the National Standards Foundation (NSF) International Council of public health consultants as a voting member.

Ralph served as Trustee for the CIPHI Environmental Health Foundation of Canada (EHFC) and is an active member of CIPHI and ASPHIO. He developed the safe water curriculum for the new environmental health degree program at Conestoga College and is a part time instructor.

Ralph has been recognized for his contributions to public health as follows:

- President's Award from ASPHIO
- Lilli Ann Zahara Award from the EHFC
- CIPHI Ontario Award of Merit for Outstanding Achievement in Environmental Health
- Lifetime member of OPHA

After 40 years in Public Health, **Ken Gorman**, Director of Health Protection at the Durham Region Health Department retired on May 31, 2018. Ken has been a superb leader in Public Health and his passion for the profession is admirable!

Ken started his career as a Public Health Inspector in Peel Region in 1978, moving to Scarborough Health Department in 1980, and joined Durham Region in 1999. During his tenure in Scarborough, he was a PHI, a Senior PHI in IDPC/IPAC, and a manager and A/Director for Environmental Health and Infectious Diseases. After amalgamation, he became the Healthy Environments Manager for East Region (Scarborough and East York) and during 1999 the Chair/Acting Director for HE for Toronto Public Health.

Ken has a long and distinguished career and extensive schooling. He has a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Toronto in Fresh Water Biology, Certificate in Public Health Inspection from Ryerson, Certificate in Occupational Health & Safety and Certificate in Infection Prevention & Control, Masters Certificate in Municipal Management, and several post-graduate MBA courses.

Ken has participated on numerous boards and planning tables including alPHa, ASPHIO, CIPHI and the MOHLTC. He was on the alPHa Board of Directors for 10 years, led the development and implementation of ASPHIO Guidelines for Farmers Markets and Special Events, is a past president of ASPHIO, member of the CIPHI ON Branch Regulated Health Profession Working Group, and many other endeavors.

2017 Member Dues Infographic

CIPHI Ontario members are familiar with the \$200 membership dues paid to CIPHI National each year to maintain their membership status, and to receive member benefits, such as discounted registration fees at conferences, and health club membership savings.

The "How We Use Your Dues" infographic was originally developed in 2016 by Kate Beath, CIPHI Ontario Secretary-Treasurer, with support from Lori Holmes, CIPHI Ontario Membership Support & Engagement Councillor, to provide information on Ontario membership, and how your membership dues are used within our branch. Values in this graphic are based on membership numbers from 2017.

CIPHI Ontario has the largest membership base across all branches, representing nearly 43% of all members on a National scale. CIPHI Ontario was represented by nearly 750 members in 2017, with nearly 500 regular memberships.

Although the number of Student Memberships has offered invaluable support to both CIPHI National and CIPHI Ontario for our designation and organization, the money from membership dues for Student Member registrations was not included in this infographic, as only Regular Member registrations contribute to the CIPHI Ontario budget.

The \$50 received from each Regular Membership registration contributes to costs associated with national and provincial conferences, awards and bursaries, educational opportunities including workshops and the CIPHI Ontario Seminar Series, as well as supporting the CIPHI Ontario volunteers and working groups who help support our branch on a day-to-day basis.

The CIPHI Ontario Professional Development Working Group Wants You!

In the Fall of 2016, the MOHLTC and CIPHI Ontario conducted a needs assessment survey for Ontario Certified Public Health Inspectors (PHIs).

Not surprisingly, 95% of respondents believe on-going professional development is important to career development. This aligns with an abundance of evidence demonstrating professional development is an important driver for employee engagement and motivation¹.

To address this need and to support the Continuing Professional Competencies (CPC) program, the CIPHI Ontario Professional Development Working Group (PDWG) is working to expand professional development opportunities.



SOPHe Pubs with PHIs (Winter 2018)


On February 27, 2018, the SOPHe Course Union hosted another Pub with PHIs event at Ryerson University.
